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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

At Murray State, we are standing on the shoulders of giants. Our past has led us to where we are today.

Since the beginning, Murray State College has fostered growth in our students and communities. Our student body and programs have grown to a level where the expansion of our current capacity and facilities is needed. As we complete our Facilities Master Plan, designed to lay out a 15-year vision that will equip our college with what we need to be successful, I would like to share some of our facility plans.

“We have several renovation projects that will help accommodate the needs of Aggie Nation in the coming years.”

In partnership with the Chickasaw Nation and the U.S. EDA, Murray State is renovating Chickasaw Hall, built in 1917, to be a boutique hotel on our Tishomingo campus. This hotel will be a living laboratory, creating 68 jobs for students and community members

At our Ardmore campus, Murray State is a project partner with the

Chickasaw Nation on a USDA Climate SMART grant that provides start-up funding for an Agriculture and Healthy Living Center. This program is designed to provide education to underserved students and local farmers about agriculture practices on a small scale. It will also educate the public about the importance of agriculture, such as the sustainable farming of crops like native pecans.

Looking to the future, our Board of Regents have settled on two top facility priorities. First, a state-of-the-art renovation of the student union at our Tishomingo campus. A delegation of our student leaders toured other student unions for ideas and gave recommendations based on the needs of our students and the community. Our new student union will have modern dining and catering capability, both large and small community meeting spaces, student activities areas, and may even host student wellness services. The idea is to create an attractive hub of the important elements in student life.

Another priority is to develop and build our Ardmore campus to reflect our dedication to the Ardmore community and provide state-of-

the-art healthcare and student support facilities. Therefore, we have begun the development phase for the Southern Oklahoma Center for Nursing and Health Education.

Murray State College's gunsmithing program was started in 1979 and provides training in custom gun-making and gun repair. The program has outgrown its current facility. A new facility is required to accommodate this unique program's growth and expansion plans.

Oklahoma Secretary of Commerce Chad Mariska recently referred to Murray State's gunsmithing program as a point of pride for the state of Oklahoma.

These are just some of the projects in our comprehensive Facilities Master Plan.

As I reflect on the rich history of Murray State, I look forward to paving the way for even greater levels of success for our students and the communities we serve. Our future is as bright as it has ever been because we are focusing on our strengths and building upon the strong foundation of our past.

FOUNDATION

The Murray State College Foundation has a long tradition of supporting student scholarships and providing stewardship of endowment funds given by individuals and families who love MSC and its mission.

One such endowment is the Chapman Family Endowment. Established in 2017, this endowment provides two opportunities for freshmen and sophomore students: The Fred Chapman Jr. and William C. Chapman Family Endowed Scholarships.

The families of Fred A. Chapman Jr. and William C. Chapman of Ardmore, Oklahoma, own and operate Chapman Ranches, located in the vicinity of Mannsville, Oklahoma. The family has grown pecans and raised cattle since their father, Fred A. Chapman Sr., began the farm and ranch operations in 1917. Chapman Ranch spans across Carter, Marshall and Murray Counties in Oklahoma, and into Red River and Bowie Counties in Texas.

The scholarships are available to students majoring in Agriculture, due to the generosity of the Chapman family. Recipients must be enrolled full time and maintain a GPA of 2.5 or higher.

She has reinforced to students that they can do anything that they put their minds to and looks forward to doing so in a larger capacity as the new Interim Vice President of the Murray State Ardmore campus, where she will oversee operations.

Cothran has called Murray home since 2005. She began her tenure in higher education as a music

instructor and choir director, and eventually became the Fine Arts and Humanities Department Chair in 2012. She became the Assistant Vice President of Academic Affairs in 2014, a position that served as a predecessor to her new role.

With the needs of both students and the community in mind, Cothran has made significant contributions to program development during her tenure at Murray State College.

Cothran was responsible for developing Murray State's Applied Technology Degree program. This program grants course credit toward a college degree to students attending Southern Tech, thus allowing students to seamlessly transfer and capitalize on skills already acquired through a technology center or an occupation. She was also instrumental in starting a partnership with Michelin North America in Ardmore to develop MSC's Industrial Engineering program. This initiative led to the creation of the Michelin Tech Scholar Program, which pays for students' tuition, fees and textbooks.

She has also worked to increase the number of online programs

at Murray State College. This educational flexibility for students led MSC to create an online college, Murray Online.

While working primarily at the MSC-Tishomingo campus, Cothran is not new to the area. With seven generations having lived in the Ardmore and Gene Autry area, the educational footprints left by her family run deep in southern Oklahoma. Her mother and several other family members have served or are currently serving as teachers in the Ardmore, Dickson, Lone Grove, Marietta and Plainview school districts. Cothran also served as a music teacher for Springer Public Schools when she began her career in education. Both sets of Cothran's grandparents were business owners in Ardmore. She is married to a classmate from Dickson Schools, Brian Cothran, who is an agriculture professor and the new Dean of the School of Agriculture, Business, Occupational Technology. They have two adult children, Cody and Macy.

Cothran looks forward to continuing the strong and contagious momentum that she has always possessed into her new role. Alongside her team in Ardmore, they hope to further aid new and current students in paving successful journeys and assisting potential employers.

"I hope to discover and learn the needs of our community and students and how we can better support our industry partners," Cothran said.

Cothran says she is also committed to meeting the needs of the students by offering programs relevant to the student's future that will impact generations to come in the Ardmore area.

"It's exciting, and I look forward to developing sustainable opportunities and removing barriers to provide students with higher education in the community where I was born," Cothran said.

ACADEMIC TEAM

In January, Murray State College was the host site for the Community College South Central Sectional Tournament academic quiz bowl.

New to the quiz bowl, Murray's academic team went 9-1 and secured a bid to the national championship tournament. Freshman team captain Marshall Barnett was the tournament's leading scorer.

**The national tournament will be on February 24-25 in Chicago, Illinois. Results will be provided in the April issue.*



At the community college level, quiz bowl is a competitive, academic, interscholastic activity for which players attend periodic practices, and then represent their school at varsity tournaments.

Those tournaments may be based on the school's athletic conference or state, but in most cases, they are open to all schools able to make the trip.

Quiz bowl questions range across the entire spectrum of a community college curriculum, and also include a certain number of current events, sports and popular culture. The matches feature a blend of individual competition and team collaboration, since no individual player is likely to

be an expert in all subject areas. Quiz bowl can reinforce classroom lessons and encourage players to go beyond their majors to master other areas as well.

Nationwide, the most common form of competition is the so-called "Saturday tournament," in which anywhere from 4 to 24 teams from different community colleges drive to a central location (the "host") and play five to twelve matches, each of which takes about 30 minutes.

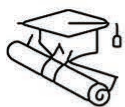

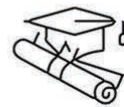

In 1979, Murray States' program began and has evolved to meet the needs of industry over the years.

Murray's gunsmithing program is a two-year Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) in Gunsmithing Technology.

What sets Murray State College's program apart from others is the Associate in Custom Gunmaking degree. Once students earn their Associate in Gunsmithing Technology, they have the option to continue for one more year and apply for the custom gun-making program. This opportunity provides an in-depth look at the customization work that is often requested for shotguns and pistols. Students also learn specialized techniques in one year, that would normally take others years to master.

“What I like best is that we actually learn the theory about why we do certain tasks, not just ‘do it,’ and move on. We get to see the overall picture of how everything comes together.”

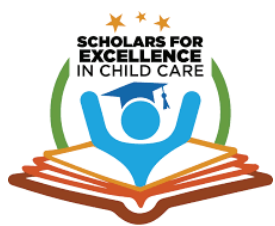
MURRAY STATE COLLEGE RECEIVES WATER CONSERVATION AWARD

"I thoroughly enjoy being able to help child care providers find a way to gain an education so that they can better care for children," McLean said. "I love to see them accomplish things that they never dreamt that they could."

Murray State College has announced that their new online college will be named Murray Online.

Murray State College has been offering online programs for more than 20 years. In 2013, Murray State College became a quality matter campus to ensure best practices and support online students. The same year, business was the first online degree offered. The new Dean, Amy McCain, will further provide attention to the virtual needs of the online campus that currently offers 11 programs. Several new online degrees will be launched this year.

The online college will allow students to focus on their daily lives and careers while still attending a Quality Accredited College. One of the goals is to help students earn their degree and start to work or prepare for the next level of education.
